Declaration of Interests by Members – interests of members in contracts and other matters

Declarations of Interest are a standard item on every Council and Committee agenda and each Member must provide a full record of their interests in the Public Register.

In addition, alongside the Register of Interest, the Members Code of Conduct ("the Code") requires the Declaration of Interests at meetings. Members have to decide first whether or not they have a disclosable interest in the matter under discussion.

Please see the Members' Code of Conduct as set out in Section 14 of the Council's constitution for full details.

Disclosable Pecuniary Interest (DPI) / Other Disclosable Interest (ODI)

DPI's and ODI's are interests defined in the Code of Conduct that has been adopted by the District.

If you have a DPI (as defined in the Code) in a matter being considered at a meeting of the Council (as defined in the Code), the Council's Standing Orders require you to leave the room where the meeting is held, for the duration of any discussion or voting on that matter.

If you have an ODI (as defined in the Code) you will need to consider whether you need to leave the room during the consideration of the matter.

Co-opted Members

Scrutiny Committees may wish to appoint Co-Opted Members to sit on their committee in order to add value to the scrutiny process. To appoint a Co-Opted Member, a Committee must first agree to appoint either a specific person or to approach a relevant organisation to request that they put forward a suitable representative (e.g. the local Police Authority). Co-Optees are non voting by default but Committees can decide to appoint voting rights to a Co-Optee. The Co-Option of the Member will last no longer than the remainder of the municipal year.

Scrutiny Committees can at any meeting agree to terminate the Co-Option of a Co-Opted Member with immediate effect. Where an organisation is appointed to put forward a Co-Opted Member, they are able to send a substitute in exceptional circumstances, provided that they notify Democratic Services in advance. Co-Opted Members must sign up to the Members Code of Conduct before attending their first meeting, failure to sign will mean that they are unable to participate. This also applies to substitute Co-Opted Members, who will need to allow sufficient time before a meeting in order to sign the Code of Conduct.

The following will apply:

- i) The total number of voting co-opted members on any Scrutiny Committee will not exceed 25% at any one time
- ii) The total number of voting Co-opted Members on any Review Panel will not be limited.
- iii) Those Co-opted Members with voting rights will exercise their rights in accordance with the principles of decision making set out in the constitution.

OS.30 Declarations of Interests by Members

Councillor MJ Hart declared an other disclosable interest (ODI) in respect of Agenda Item number 8 – Cookley and Caunsall Neighbourhood Plan Area Designation, as he sat on Wolverley and Cookley Parish Council.

OS.31 Minutes

Decision: The minutes of the meeting held on 5th July 2018 be confirmed as a correct record and signed by the Chairman.

OS.32 How Are We Doing? Performance Update

The Committee considered a report from the Business Improvement Officer which updated Members on the performance of the Council for quarter 1 (from 1st April to 30th June 2018).

The Business Improvement Officer presented the report and appendices which included detailed updates on the performance against the Council's priority of 'Enabling' and the progress of its Capital Projects. Members were advised that as to be expected for quarter 1 there were no overdue actions and as such there was no exception report included on this occasion. There was however, a comprehensive update on the risks in relation to the reported priority.

Agreed: The progress in performance for quarter 1 be noted.

OS.33 Homelessness Strategy Refresh

The Committee considered a report from the Head of Strategic Growth which set out the new Homelessness Strategy "Worcestershire's Strategic Direction for Tackling Homelessness 2018-2021" and provided an update on the responses to the strategy consultation.

The Principal Housing Strategy Officer led Members through the report. She advised that the Strategic Direction for Tackling Homelessness has been written to expand on the high level actions within the Housing Partnership Plan and in response to the new duties of the Homelessness Reduction Act which came into force on 3rd April 2018.

She added that the Homelessness Strategy had three main priorities which were to prevent homelessness at a much earlier stage by targeting groups that are more vulnerable to becoming homeless and developing complex needs in the future; to provide flexible and comprehensive responses to those in crisis and those with complex needs; and to improve the supply of and access to good quality, affordable and supported housing.

In response to Members questions, the Principal Housing Strategy Officer advised that there were approximately 3000 people on the housing waiting list in Wyre Forest and following the annual count which was undertaken last November, four people were identified as rough sleepers.

Members welcomed the strategy which set out the Council's plans for the prevention of homelessness and for ensuring that sufficient accommodation and support is or will be available for people who become homeless or who are at risk of becoming homeless.

Agreed: Recommend to Cabinet that the draft Homelessness Strategy "Worcestershire Strategic Direction for Tackling Homelessness 2018 – 2021" be approved.

OS.34 Annual Report on Treasury Management Service and Actual Prudential Indicators 2017-18

The Committee considered a report from the Corporate Director: Resources which provided a review of the treasury management activities for 2017-18, in line with the Chartered Institute of Public Finance and Accountancy (CIPFA) Code of Practice on Treasury Management (the Code) and the CIPFA Prudential Code for Capital Finance in Local Authorities (the Prudential Code).

The Corporate Director: Resources led Members through the report and advised that this was the first of three statutory reports which would be presented to the Committee during the municipal year. She added the Council's Treasury Management Advisors, Link Asset Services, had provided a comprehensive Member training session on 3rd September 2018, which was followed by a detailed scrutiny of the report by the Treasury Management Review Panel.

The Corporate Director: Resources was pleased to report that the treasury management activities for 2017-18 had fully complied with the Council's approved strategy.

The Chairman of the Treasury Management Review Panel, Councillor F M Oborski MBE, encouraged all Members of the Council to attend the training and she thanked the Corporate Director: Resources and her team for the excellent job they do in this service area.

Councillor Knowles said that the training had been very informative and had covered local issues in addition to what was happening globally. He praised the professionalism of the advice given to Members from both the Treasury Management Advisors and the Council Officers.

Agreed: Recommend to Council to:

- 1. Approve the actual 2017-18 prudential and treasury indicators in the report.
- 2. Note the annual treasury management report for 2017-18.

Councillor M J Hart made his declaration at this point, (6.35pm).

OS.35 Cookley and Caunsall Neighbourhood Plan Area Designation

The Committee considered a report from the Senior Planning Policy Officer which sought approval for the designation of part of Wolverley and Cookley Parish as a Neighbourhood Area for the purposes of Neighbourhood Development Planning.

The Senior Planning Policy Officer presented the report. She explained that as Wolverley and Cookley Parish Council wished to prepare a Neighbourhood Development Plan for part of the Parish that included Cookley and Caunsall but not Wolverley, an application to the District Council had to be made.

The Senior Planning Policy Officer advised that on receipt of the application, the District Council undertook a six week period of public consultation. Members reviewed the responses received to the public consultation and noted that all respondents supported the proposal.

She added that if the District Council agreed to the designation of the Neighbourhood Area, the Parish Council would begin the preparation of their Neighbourhood Development Plan. Following submission to the District Council, the Plan would need to be published for a statutory six week consultation period, prior to an Examination in public. A local referendum would then be held where a minimum of 50% of those voting must be in favour of its adoption.

Agreed: Recommend to Cabinet that the Neighbourhood Plan area designation be approved for the purposes of Neighbourhood Development Planning as shown on the map at Appendix 1 of the report.

OS.36 Asset Transfer of Spennells Changing Rooms and Adjacent Parcel of Public Open Space

The Committee received a report from the Community Safety and Partnerships Officer which invited Members to discuss the options for bringing the redundant Spennells Changing Rooms back into community use.

The Community Safety and Partnerships Officer led Members through the report. She advised that the changing rooms located at Heronswood Road Play Area had been closed for over 10 years. She added that the Aggborough and Spennells Ward Members had hoped for a long time that the changing rooms would be redeveloped for community use.

She explained that the 9th Kidderminster (Spennells) Scout Group (KD9 Scouts) had expressed an interest in taking over the changing rooms in order to build a new headquarters on the site. Members were advised that since June 2017 the Leader of the Council had held quarterly meetings with Ward Members, representatives from the KD9 Scouts and the Council's Corporate Director: Community Well-being and Environment and the Community Safety and Partnerships Officer to discuss the proposal.

The Committee welcomed and were fully supportive of the proposed transfer. Members agreed that it would not only benefit the KD9 Scouts, but also the wider community as there were currently no community facilities on the Spennells Estate for residents to use.

Agreed: Recommend to Cabinet to transfer the changing rooms and adjacent parcel of open space to KD9 Scouts.

OS.37 Feedback from Cabinet

Agreed: The content of the Cabinet decision list following consideration of the recommendations from its meeting on 17th July 2018 be noted.

OS.38 Work Programme

The Committee considered the work programme for the current municipal year. The Chairman advised that the scrutiny into the service standards for highways maintenance had commenced, and the review of civil enforcement issues was scheduled for the latter part of the year. Members were asked to submit a scoping form for any items they would like to be considered for further scrutiny.

Agreed: The work programme be noted.

OS.39 Press Involvement

There were no future items for scrutiny that might require publicity.

OS.40 Exempt Information

OS.41 Depot 2020 Masterplan – Improve and Invest

The Committee considered the financial envelope for the Depot 2020 – improve and invest project.

The Corporate Director: Community Well-being and Environment led Members in detail through the exempt report. She advised that as with all major capital projects, you cannot be specific about timescales as there may be unforeseen issues which come to light as the project evolves. Members were reminded of the update on the project by way of the Council's 'No Surprises Policy'.

Members discussed the current revisions to the business plan following the tender process for the project which would enable thorough due diligence of the submitted tenders prior to an award of contract.

The majority of the Committee agreed that in order for the project to progress, the proposed amendment to the capital programme should be agreed.

Agreed: Recommend to Cabinet that the proposed amendment to the capital programme as detailed in the exempt report, to accommodate the gross capital costs associated with the overall project in light of the tenders received, which includes an additional amount for risk contingency, be agreed.

OSCS.05 Investment Proposal

The Sub-Committee received a confidential report which set out a proposed investment using the Council's Capital Portfolio Fund.

Councillor T L Onslow entered the meeting at this point, (6.06pm).

The Corporate Director: Economic Prosperity & Place presented the report. He gave a comprehensive and thorough explanation of the proposed transaction and the consideration of key matters consistent with the Council's Capital Strategy and the Government Statutory Guidelines for Local Authority Investments, covering the background to the investment opportunity including its location, condition and

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valuation, tenancy details, regional and local market context and reasoning supporting the benefits to the Wyre Forest local economy.

Having outlined the justification for the investment he confirmed that the proposal met the Government's recently published Statutory Guidance for Local Authority Investments and advised that the proposal was in line with the Council's adopted Capital Portfolio Fund Strategy.

The Corporate Director: Resources provided additional explanation of the financial implications of the transaction, including proportionality, risk and key variables. 'Down-side' risks were highlighted with further information provided on the exit strategy referenced in the report including review and regular reporting of the factors that could lead to the exit strategy being activated. The importance of the role of the professional advisors in this specialist area was emphasised.

Councillor T L Onslow left the meeting at 7.06pm and returned at 7.08pm.

Members were assured by the independent professional advice taken by Officers in relation to the investment proposal. There was agreement that the property had future development potential and would diversify the Council's investment portfolio.

The proposal was moved and seconded. Upon a show of hands the majority vote was carried.

Agreed: Recommend to the Cabinet Sub-Committee that the proposed investment should proceed.

There being no further business, the meeting ended at 7.27pm.

Wyre Forest Health and Wellbeing Plan Update

1. Summary

1.1 This report is to update Members on work to improve health and wellbeing in Wyre Forest and to seek endorsement of the new Wyre Forest Health Action Plan 2018-21

2. Background

- 2.1 The Worcestershire Health and Wellbeing Board oversees local health commissioning and leads on the strategic planning and co-ordination of local health services. The Board developed the Worcestershire Joint Health and Wellbeing Strategy 2016 2020, which established priorities for this period, based on the findings of the Joint Strategic Needs Assessment. Public Health is a County Council function and WFDC works closely with the Public Health team ensuring the District Council makes a contribution to improving the health of it's residents.
- 2.2 The Wyre Forest Health and Wellbeing Stakeholder Forum (HWSF), includes representatives from a range of organisations and develops and delivers the Health and Wellbeing Plan. Progress on delivery is also reported to the Worcestershire Health Improvement Group, a subgroup of the Health and Wellbeing Board.
- 2.3 Within the District Council, delivery of this work is primarily carried out by the Public Health Practitioner for Wyre Forest and the Health and Sustainability team in Strategic Housing Services.

3. Key Issues

3.1 Improving the health and wellbeing of residents in Wyre Forest remains a key area of work. The latest Public Health England profile (2018) for Wyre Forest shows that there are some indicators that are significantly worse than the national or regional average including smoking in pregnancy, breastfeeding rate and dementia diagnosis (a new indicator for 2018). Whilst indicators for Obese Children and Excess Weight in Adults are currently not significantly different to England

average, local values are still concerning. In Wyre Forest 20% of Year 6 children (10-11 year olds) are obese and 60.3% of adults are carrying excess weight.

- 3.2 The Wyre Forest Health and Wellbeing Plan aims to tackle these issues as well as the Worcestershire Health and Wellbeing Board's current priorities to keep everyone physically active, prevent alcohol harm and maintain good mental health and wellbeing.
- 3.3 Below is an update on some examples of projects undertaken as part the 2017/18 Health Action Plan (shown at Appendix 1):

3.3.1 Five Ways to Wellbeing

Evidence suggests there are five steps we can all take to improve our mental wellbeing. These steps fall under the headings of Connect, Be Active, Keep Learning, Give and Take Notice. The 5 Ways are being promoted locally throughout 2018. In February/March, the campaign encouraged people to 'Connect' with others by taking part in a variety of events and activities. In April/May, many of the opportunities available to help people 'Be Active' were promoted, a series of led walks was arranged and the Leisure Centre held an open weekend whereby people could try out the many activities on offer for free. The remaining themes are being promoted throughout the remainder of the year.

3.3.2 Dementia Action

Dementia Action Week in May saw two successful events take place in Wyre Forest. The Stourport event was combined with the launch of the town's Dementia Action Alliance (DAA). Many people came along, including from local businesses, to support the work of the DAA and to help make Stourport more dementia friendly. The event in Kidderminster town centre also went well and helped raised awareness of dementia and how individuals can be supported to live well with the condition. Dementia Friends training is also available to further raise awareness and to help individuals understand more about the condition. 61 people completed Dementia Friends training in Wyre Forest in 2017/18. Since the beginning of the dementia friends programme (2013), in the DY9, DY10, DY11, DY12, DY13 and DY14 postcodes, there have been 95 dementia friends sessions delivered, 919 dementia friends made, 516 digital friends and 17 people who have converted to being a dementia friends champion.

3.3.3 Health Walks

Four Health Walk Groups in the district (Kidderminster Stride and Stroll, Best Foot Forward, Wyre Forest and Stanmore House Strollers)

between them run 15 walks per week. The Health Walks are led by volunteers with free Walk Leader training available. In 2017/18 there were 734 people registered as walkers with these groups, with 220 of these new walkers within this period.

The Health Walks are co-ordinated and supported by the Worcestershire Health Walks Officer.

3.3.4 Social Prescribing

Social Prescribing enables GPs and other frontline healthcare professionals to refer patients to a social prescriber. The social prescriber helps the patient find out about opportunities to improve their own health and wellbeing and can motivate and support them to achieve their desired change.

Social Prescribing pilot projects began across Worcestershire in March. In Wyre Forest, social prescribing covers all district GP practices and is being run by the Worcestershire Association of Carers. A monthly 'help hub' is held at Kidderminster Medical Centre with various organisations providing information to the public. Individuals are referred to the social prescribers for assistance or support with anything that is non-clinical, for example this may be housing related, experiencing social isolation or financial.

3.3.5 Starting Well

In July 2018, local organisations held a Healthy Family Fun Day at Kidderminster Youth House to promote the Starting Well Service for 0-19 year olds in Worcestershire. The event was well attended with advice and information given on topics such as breastfeeding, weaning, healthy eating, weight management and local sports sessions and activities.

- **3.4** The updated Wyre Forest Health Action Plan (Appendix 2) reflects the priorities of the Worcestershire Health and Wellbeing Strategy:
 - improving mental health and well-being
 - increasing physical activity
 - reducing the harm caused by alcohol.

It also reflects additional local priorities and the key principles of partnership, empowerment, local action, rigour, involvement, transparency and accountability.

Climate Change Update

1. Summary

1.1 This report provides an update on implementation of the Wyre Forest Climate Change Action Plan 2017/18 and seeks endorsement of the updated action plan for 2018/19.

2. Background

- 2.1 The Health and Sustainability Team in Housing Services lead the coordination and delivery of work to tackle climate change issues in Wyre Forest.
- 2.2 The updated Wyre Forest Climate Change Strategy and 2017/18 action plan were approved by Overview and Scrutiny Committee and Cabinet in September 2017. The strategy was written in alignment with the Worcestershire Climate Change Strategy and aims to deliver the Worcestershire strategy within Wyre Forest.
- 2.3 The strategy focuses on key areas where Wyre Forest District Council and partners can have the most impact in the district, within current resources. It has four key themes:
 - 1. Warmer, healthier homes.
 - 2. Building a low carbon economy.
 - 3. Transport and infrastructure.
 - 4. Healthy and resilient communities.

3. Key Issues

3.1 The United Nations Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change (IPCC) releases an assessment report on the latest climate change science every five years. The latest report considered evidence from many independent scientific analyses and has been endorsed by all UN member States. Scientists are now all but certain that climate change is mostly caused by human action, and that it is already leading to changes in regional weather

patterns, with extreme events such as flooding and heat waves on the increase. The Industrial Revolution led to an increase in greenhouse gas emissions caused by human activity. The Earth's surface has consequently warmed by about 0.8°C since around 1900, with much of this warming occurring in the past 50 years. If the global average temperature rises more than 2°C above pre-industrial levels, significant negative impacts of climate c hange will be more likely and the cost of managing them will rise sharply. The Paris Agreement, which came into force in 2016 and has so far been ratified by 194 countries, aims to limit the rise in global temperatures to well below 2°C, to pursue efforts to hold it to 1.5°C and to reach net zero emissions in the second half of the century.

- 3.2 The Climate Change Act 2008, legislated by the UK Parliament, commits the UK to reducing emissions by at least 80% by 2050 from 1990 levels. This is to be achieved through a series of legally binding 5-year 'carbon budgets'. The Committee on Climate Change (the CCC) is an independent, statutory body which advises the government on emissions targets and reports progress on reducing greenhouse gas emissions and preparing for climate change. The CCC's latest report shows that since 1990 UK emissions had fallen by 43% by 2017, while GDP had increased by over 60%. This fall was largely due to reduced use of coal and increased use of renewable energy in the power sector. Emissions reductions in this sector alone will not be enough to meet forthcoming carbon budgets. The latest CCC report advises that government needs to provide consistent policy and effective regulation, that there needs to be support for simple, low-cost options and long term investement for low carbon infrastructure.
- 3.3 Councils have a pivotal role in tackling climate change and, through local governance, can ensure climate change policies and programmes protect and help the most vulnerable, particularly the fuel poor. Local authorities are uniquely placed to assess the needs of their areas and local residents and to act as catalysts for change. The Home Energy Conservation Act (HECA) recognises local authorities' ability to use their position to improve the energy efficiency of all residential accommodation in their areas. HECA requires local authorities to produce a series of reports, setting out the energy conservation measures that considered practicable, cost-effective and likely to result in significant improvement in the energy efficiency of residential accommodation in its area. Fuel poverty is an issue for the district; latest statistics show that 5,583 Wyre Forest households (12.5%) are classed as being fuel poor. Living in cold, damp homes can exacerbate health conditions, particularly cardiovascular and respiratory illnesses. Worcestershire has slightly higher than average excess winter deaths, the majority of which tend to be caused by diseases of the cardiovascular system (such as stroke and heart attack) and respiratory illness (e.g. influenza).
- 3.4 Each year, central government releases per capita CO2 emissions figures for all local authorities. Between 2005 and 2016 (the latest data available) total emissions from housing, industry and transport fell by 34.3% in Wyre Forest and 33% across Worcestershire.

3.5 Appendix 1 sets out progress on delivery of the Climate Change Action Plan 2017/18. The case studies below set out examples of some of the work undertaken.

Case study 1: Heating and insulation.

We continue to work with other local authorities and agencies such as Act on Energy through the Warmer Worcestershire Network to bring in external funding and deliver energy efficiency schemes. 94 private properties in the district had heating and insulation improvements made through the funded schemes available in 2017/18. This includes schemes funded through Disabled Facilities Grants (for any disabled/ vulnerable person diagnosed with a respiratory illness or on Disability Living Allowance/Personal Independence Allowance) and Home Repairs Assistance loans (as a local land charge on the property) as well as through the Energy Company Obligation (ECO). Going forward, the Warmer Worcestershire Network has successfully bid for funding for a project to deliver first time gas central heating in urban areas and will continue working to channel in further ECO funding in 2018/19.

Case study 2: Wyre Forest Big Energy Switch

Many people are not on the best value energy tariff and pay more than they need but are reluctant to switch. Collective energy switching is a way of helping to address this situation and can help people lower their fuel bills. WFDC has so far run two 'Wyre Forest Big Energy Switch' schemes in partnership with specialist switching company ichoosr, who join together schemes like this from across the country, bringing residents together to use group buying power to get an exclusive deal from energy suppliers. 258 Wyre Forest households switched suppliers through the Wyre Forest Big Energy Switches which took place in May 2017 and Feb 2018. These households are estimated to have saved a combined total of £65k per year on their energy bills by switching through the scheme. The next Wyre Forest Big Energy Switch is due to take place in January/February 2019.

Case study 3: Supporting community activities

Over the last year, the team ran two Greener Living Shows, organised in conjunction with voluntary groups including Transition Bewdley and Transition Kidderminster. A wide variety of organisations were on hand to offer advice to help people live a healthier and more environmentally friendly lifestyle, with topics ranging from energy saving and electric vehicles to veganism, reducing food waste and single use plastics. These events continue to be popular with more than 500 people attended the 2018 Greener Living Shows.

The Wyre Forest Repair Cafe continues to go from strength to strength, with publicity support from WFDC. A Repair Cafe is a friendly, relaxing and social meeting space where people can take their broken, damaged or torn household items for repair advice, repair or sharpening free of charge. The types of items include electrical appliances, electronic gadgets, furniture, toys, ceramics, jewellery, garments and fabrics, clocks, garden equipment, tools and much more. The sessions are run entirely by volunteers and take place in

Bewdley and Kidderminster each month, with hundreds of items being successfully repaired each year.

3.7 An updated Climate Change Action Plan for 2018/19 is provided at Appendix 2.
